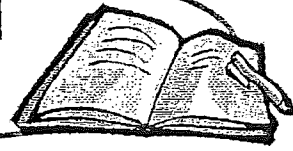

(Fiction includes a narrator and characters.)

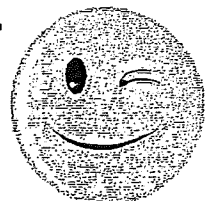
 Nonfiction: "The author writes that.."

- ❖ Based on this information...

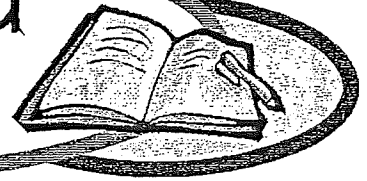
Never write
